
311,000

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

Share of U.S. public schools reporting incidents of crime in the school year 2017-18, by type of crime



Rate of student-reported nonfatal crimes against students at school in the United States in 2020, by age group and type of crime (per 1,000 students)









Responsibilities

Develop standardized security policies and procedures for all public schools nationwide

Provide initial and annual risk assessments of all schools based on identified metrics

Implementation of physical and technical security measures based on developed standards


Training of school personnel and local law enforcement

Conduct investigations and pursue prosecution of threats and actual accounts of violence at each school

Provide intelligence, analysis and investigations support of threats and actual accounts of violence within Regional Field Offices and through a National Command Center (NCC)

Collaborate with BSS Office of Medical Services to identify at risk individuals and take appropriate action

Liaison with local, state, and federal government officials, law enforcement officials, fire and emergency medical services, congress and others



Government witnesses are protected. Counterfeit money is investigated. Drugs are interdicted. Government facilities are safe guarded, and the homeland is secured. All at the hands of and by the federal government.


